

Hope through our [Failure]

Failure is a scar that isn't fatal

The Scriptures teach that just as success is never final so too failure is not fatal. Failure, like scars, don't go away but they can shrink as we grow in the power of grace.

Barnabas wanted to take John, also called Mark, with them, but Paul did not think it wise to take him, because he had deserted them in Pamphylia and had not continued with them in the work. They had such a sharp disagreement that they parted company. Barnabas took Mark and sailed for Cyprus, but Paul chose Silas and left, commended by the believers to the grace of the Lord.

Acts 15:37-40

Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, because he is helpful to me in my ministry.

2 Timothy 4:11

My fellow prisoner Aristarchus sends you his greetings, as does Mark, the cousin of Barnabas. (You have received instructions about him; if he comes to you, welcome him.)

Colossians 4:10

Failure isn't always a sign that we can't cut it. We neither forget failure nor allow it to define us. Rather, we grow through it without having to hide it.

Get up and eat, for the journey is too much for you.

1 Kings 19:7b

Burnout is only permanent if we allow it to be. Don't listen to everything that you are tempted to believe when you are exhausted. Take time to care for yourself and then get back at it as Elijah did.

Failure is a sin that can be forgiven

While the consequences after our failure on others is beyond our control, our response to our failure before others restores God's control.

Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the worst. But for that very reason I was shown mercy so that in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his immense patience as an example for those who would believe in him and receive eternal life. Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory for ever and ever.

1 Timothy 1:15-17

For those who put their faith and trust in Christ later in life, there are bound to be reasons you feel unfit for salvation and unqualified for service. The Gospel is powerful enough to save you and rescue your relationships.

Psalm 51:1-5,10-14

Deliver me from the guilt of bloodshed, O God, you who are God my Savior, and my tongue will sing of your righteousness.

Repentance saves us, not from the consequences of our actions but the eternal judgment for them.
